The Dignity for All Students Act - What Do Parents Need to Know?

New York State's Dignity for All Students Act (DASA) seeks to provide the State's public elementary and secondary school students with a safe and supportive environment free from discrimination, intimidation, taunting, harassment, and bullying on school property, a school bus and/or at a school function.

DASA defines harassment as "creation of a hostile environment by conduct or by verbal threats, intimidation or abuse that has or would have the effect of unreasonably and substantially interfering with a student's educational performance, opportunities or benefits, or mental, emotional or physical wellbeing."

Onteora is firmly committed to upholding the tenets of DASA, and the Board of Education approved the following Dignity for All Students Act coordinators.

These coordinators will help individual schools within the Onteora Central School District with collecting and reporting data regarding material incidents of discrimination and harassment.

The DASA legislation also amends section 801-a of New York State Education Law regarding instruction in civility, citizenship, and character education by expanding the concepts of tolerance, respect for others and dignity to include: an awareness and sensitivity in the relations of people, including but not limited to, different races, weights, national origins, ethnic groups, religions, religious practices, mental or physical abilities, sexual orientations, gender identity, and sexes.

The legislation also further amended Section 2801 of the Education Law by requiring Boards of Education to include language addressing DASA in their codes of conduct.
